The top three paying occupations as per the current active Collective bargaining agreements, are; Tobacco Production Machine Operators, Primary Education Teachers and Computing Professionals. 



Part 3. Top Paying Occupations by Sector

Top paying occupation per sector refers to the highest paying jobs within different sectors. This part informs job seekers looking to enter a particular industry and want to know which occupations have the highest earning potential.

- 1. <u>Agriculture</u>; Building Trade Workers, Blacksmiths, toolmakers and related trades workers, Wood processing and pulp plant operators.
- 2. <u>Manufacturing</u>; Tobacco production machine operators, Plant and machine operators and assemblers, Mechanical engineering and related technicians.
- 3. <u>Transport and Storage</u>; Travel Guides and Grounded Attendants, Cashiers Tellers and Related Clerks, Business and Public Service Middle Level Personnel.
- Financial and Insurance Activities; Metal Moulders Welders Structural Metal Preparers and related Trades Workers, Accountants Auditors and Tax Assessors, Business and Public Service Middle level personnel.
- 5. <u>Education</u>; Primary Education Teachers, Machinery Mechanics and Fitters, Protective Service Workers.
- Human Health and Social Work Activities; Accountants Auditors and Tax Assessors, Nursing and Mid-wifely professionals, Medical and clinical officers
- 7. <u>Arts</u>; Waiters and bartenders, Building trades workers, Secondary and technical institute teachers and instructors.
- 8. <u>Trade</u>; Machinery Mechanics and Fitters, Material recording and Transport clerks, Manufacturing Labourers.














